Public Comments:

Sheila Osborne: Landfill on Virden Ridge Road

Sheila Osborne thanked members of the court for letting her speak this evening. She asks members of the court if they would do a vote to let her know who is still opposed to this landfill on Virden Ridge. Ms. Osborne is with the citizens against it.

Eric Williams Speaking on Creech Road:

Eric introduced himself and told members of the court he was there to speak on Creech Road. Eric is here to request and provide physical documentation showing the adoption of Creech Road into the Powell County Road system. The property in question was purchased in 1951 by Beech Hood. It was then transferred to Charlie and Brenda Hood in 1984 and inherited by Carla Hood Smith in 2014 after the passing of her father Charlie. The Hood family has lived on this land since the 1950's and have no knowledge of the family ever granting, gifting or losing any portion of the land through condemnation or eminent domain. Based on the requirement set forth by the KGA and the Powell County Road Adoption Policy he cannot find any documentation of any process that follows under the KRS statute chapters 178, 179 or 16 or the counties' own policy which sets additional standards but must act in accordance with the KRS laws.

He found one official deed filed in the County Clerk's office stating in 1994 the landowner Charlie Hood granted an easement to the Lucas family or so-called Creech Road. The Lucas family had the easement added to their deed and since 1994 the property has been sold approximately seven plus times. Each deed to this day still states the access into the back property as an easement. Eric said to the best of his knowledge no one has ever had a Creech Road address.

(Eric passed out a copy of the Right of Way Easement to members of the court). He told them to pay attention to the physical descriptions. He said it states the owner of the easement is Charlie Hood.

Judge Barnes asks Eric if the Lucas family still lived there. Eric told him no and the property has been sold approximately seven times. The Chinese family has been the current owners since 2019.

This is where the original easement was given to James and Anna Lucas.

Judge Barnes asks members of the court if they have any questions. Magistrate Chad Patton asks Eric what he was asking for. Eric read his first statement again. He is here tonight to request and provide physical documentation showing the adoption of Creech Road into the Powell County Road system. He said it's based on the KRS and the county road adoption policy that is in place.

You are looking at surveyors, appraisers and the fifth amendment: shall not take land without compensation. Eric has no doubt the road was called Creech Road.

He does know the county has done some maintenance on it, but he feels the proper paperwork has not been accomplished. The last thing he said he would add is KRS statute that's been in place since 1942--filing of the documents with the County Clerk's office. This KRS Statute has not been amended since 1942. There have not been any official deeds, passages or any kind of grants or gifts given to the county so he is asking for proof of the road.

Magistrate Dennis Combs asked him if he wanted the road to be private. Eric told him ultimately no, but they would prefer the county to maintain the road at a future point but for now they are just trying to establish whether the county has legal rights to it. The only legal document he has been able to find in the courthouse or online is the document he passed out to them and the seven plus deeds that have been listed as easements since 1994.

Road Supervisor Patrick McCoy told Eric it would not be in a deed book it would be in a fiscal court order book. If it was adopted into the county road system since 1942 there would have to be a

resolution that was passed by the fiscal court. It would also be archived in Frankfort. Eric said he has reached out to Frankfort by email a few times, but it's been like talking to a wall. He asks if we have a county road engineer or county supervisor that proves the road. Judge Barnes told him it was the county supervisor.

Judge Barnes asks him what years we should look for. Eric said the property in question was deeded to from Sarah and Everett Barnes. It was sold in 1951 to Beech Hood. When she sold the land, she also sold twenty acres to Floyd Ginter which was on the other side of the easement and Creech Road that extends to Daniels Branch. Beech deeded out the acre to Eugene and Mable which is now Glen's property and home. Eric said he went back as far as the late 1800's and it never mentioned a road, just an easement. He said he asked for help in the County Clerk's office, but they were unable to find anything recorded about Creech Road.

Patrick said sadly the era we are talking about the fiscal court orders does not have the best indexing. He found where the county voted to approved payment for the concrete bridge on Creech Road back in 1970.

Magistrate Chad Patton ask if the county had a road adoption policy back then. Eric said he thinks the current road policy was revised in 2010.

Patrick said he has found several resolutions. If someone came and wanted their road adopted, you would have to petition the court to have it adopted by the county then a couple of Magistrates along with Judge would go inspect the roadway and then they would report back at the next meeting but most of the time the roadway was adopted.

Patrick said what we are looking for may be just one sentence in a meeting record.

Judge Barnes told Eric we would look and see what we could find and let him know. It would not be an overnight find.

John Bowman introduced himself to members of the court. He said he was Glen's son-in-law. He said the status Eric is talking about KRS 178.405 states where any private road, street or highway in an unincorporated area meaning a county road that is used by the public openly, continuously, notoriously for a period of at least fifteen years shall be implied such road or street or highway may be dedicated to public use .

But there is a caveat on this. Provided that fifty percent of all property owners abutting the private road, street or highway sign a petition stating they are willing to dedicate the road for public use.

There are three people with addresses on this road. Eric said that was incorrect because they are on Hardwicks Creek. John told Eric these addresses were according to the postal service. E911 Director Justin Rice said he assigned at least two addresses to Creech Road around a year ago.

John said if there is nothing with fiscal court documents then we should present an affidavit signed by the residents and submit it to fiscal court for approval according to statute 178.405. Robert asks if this statute read may or shall be done. John told him it reads it shall be done. Robert said the statute reads: It shall be implied that such road, street or highway maybe dedicated to public use. John said going back to the question and he means it with sincerity, he is asking what the end game is. They have people that live on the road so it would land lock the property. Eric told him you cannot land lock a piece of property and that is not the intention.

It's in the best interest for Hood's to get it as a county road because as private landowners having to maintain it would not be cheap. Eric said the end goal is not to get it discontinued its just to see if there are any records on file and if not then we need to discuss getting them done correctly and putting them in books the way it should be.

Judge Barnes said we need to try and find the original agreement first and if we cannot then we can properly record it and get it on file.

Brandon McByre: Robbie Ridge Road:

Brandon was present at the meeting to discuss Robbie Ridge Road. He is a representative of the HMA's with around 50 homes in that area.

There has been a slide on the road, but they do not have enough funds in their HOA's to do the repair.

He told members of the court they were trying to figure out what they could do before it gets worse. Judge Barnes said unfortunately we have no jurisdiction because it is a private drive.

CSEPP Director Kevin Babcock said FEMA did go and look at the slide but it being private property therefore there is no funding available. Mr. McByre said he is unsure about what to do. Mr. Babcock told him the HMOs should have some type of insurance that would cover within the area. Mr.

McByre said when the HMOs were set up, they were not done incorrectly. Deputy Judge Dale Allen told him he owned lots in the area, and the HMOs fee is supposed to be used to maintain their road. Judge Barnes said even if the county could help the road would not meet the road

recommendations.

County Attorney Robert King suggested talking to a private attorney about the prospect of getting something brought before the Circuit Judge to try and enforce the collection of dues.

Members of the court told Mr. Brye they wished there was something they could do to help but there was not.

No Action Taken

Stanton Tourism Director Hugh Stump: Hosting an Event at the Stanton City Park:

Stanton Tourism Director Hugh Stump was present at the meeting to let members of the court know Stanton Tourism would be hosting an event at Stanton City Park on Saturday October 25 from 12:00 p.m. until 7:00 p.m.

There will be two motorcycle stunt shows along with a magic show, a kids' area to play, spooky storytelling, food trucks, bike rides and shows. The bikers will go on a bike ride which will be led by the Stanton City Police. They will go to the Slade Welcome Center and hang out for a while and then come back to the city park and do a Truck or Treat at 6:30 p.m.

Mr. Stump said this is something they wanted to do to try to get some more people from outside of the region into Powell County.

Magistrate Brian McKinney told him the Clay City Parkway had a cart race on October 4th. They had over 300 entries and people from 12 different states raced.

Judge Barnes said he would like to thank Stanton Tourism, Powell County Tourism and Clay City Tourism for bringing in venues.

Mr. Melvin Burger:

Mr. Burger was present at the meeting to express his concerns on East Adams Ridge Road. Judge Barnes told County Attorney Robert King about this private road, but the county blacktopped it. Mr. Burgher said children ride motorcycles and go carts and he's afraid that a child will get hurt and then he will get sued because of it. County Attorney Robert King told Mr. Burgher if it's a private road then he could tell them to stay off it. Magistrate Brian McKinney suggested putting speed bumps up since it's a private road.

Magistrate J.L. Bowen asks Road Supervisor Patrick McCoy if we maintain the road for snow and ice. Patrick told him he did not think so. He thinks at one time it was a county road but later it was given to the landowners. Mr. Burgher said when the county did use a snow plow the snow was piled up, which put everyone in a bind including the mail carrier. He said he would rather no one plow the road. Judge Barnes told Patrick to take that road off the list.

Magistrate Dennis Combs asks Mr. Burgher how many people lived on that road. He told him according to the deed there were around eleven people involved.

Judge Barnes said if everyone agrees then he suggested putting in the speed bumps because the county has no authority to do anything.

Magistrate J.L. Bowen told him to post no trespassing signs, keep out signs and not responsible for any accident signs on each side of the road. Judge Barnes suggested he speak with a private attorney regarding this.

Magistrate Dennis Combs asked Mr. Burgher if he would be interested in making it a county road. He told him no because it was his old home place.

Purchase of New Building for Animal Shelter:

Animal Control Officer Brandon Farmer presented a quote from Creekside Buildings. The quote was for a 10x20 metal hi-side Dutch building, 2 24x36 windows and 1 ladder in the amount of \$4,871.00.

Brandon talked about prices for a dual heating and cooling unit. The prices were from Lowes, Home Depot and Ace. He said Lowes had the best unit. He also priced installation, drywall, screws, fiberglass and joint tape. He talked to John Knootz about installing the electric. The electrical supplies will cost around \$1,000 to \$1,500.00. Brandon also asks members of the court if he could spend up to \$500.00 on office furnishing for the new building. The plan is to use the new building for a processing area so that the public can engage with the animals and have an adoption space. All the requests total around \$7,322.00. Magistrate Dennis Combs asked Brandon if he quoted the materials locally. He told him he has got most of the pricing online, but he would like to purchase locally.

A motion was made by Magistrate J.L. Bowen seconded by Magistrate Brian McKinney with all members present voting in favor of approving Animal Control Officer Brandon Farmer to spend up to \$8,000.00 on the new building from Creekside Buildings, a heating and cooling unit, materials and supplies.

Motion passed unanimously

Food Service for Powell County Detention Center:

Jailer Teddy Lacy called before the meeting and asked to table the discussion about the food service until next month.

New Business:

Department Head Updates:

Road Supervisor Patrick McCoy:

(Approval to purchase a 2025 Chevrolet 3500 Silverado)

Road Supervisor Patrick McCoy lets members know we have been approved for the CPPP Program to pave Old Winchester Road #2 and one mile of Copperas Creek Road

He is hoping to have Old Winchester Road #2 ready for pavement this week. The completion date will be around November 30th, 2025. We are waiting to hear back about the Resolution that was sent to the State regarding our Flex Funds. The funding will be for Wild Cherry Land, Oak Ridge Road, Silver Maple and Rose Lane. Hopefully these repairs can be done at the same time.

They are trying to get entrance pipes completed as soon as possible.

Patrick said they found a bad spot on the frame of the 2010 Dodge 2500. They would like to use this truck as backup. Patrick got a quote for replacing this truck.

The quote was received from Dutch Ishmael Chevrolet Inc. for a 2025 Chevrolet 3500 Silverado in the amount of \$48,990.00. This price quoted is under the Kentucky State pricing.

He said they would like to go with Chevrolet this time because of their rust 8 year rust through warranty on the frame and a corrosion warranty which covers paint bubbles, etc.

A motion was made by Magistrate J.L. Bowen seconded by Magistrate Dennis Combs with all members present voting in favor of approving the quote submitted from Dutch Ishmael Chevrolet for a 2025 Chevrolet 3500 Silverado in the amount of \$48,990.00.

Motion passed unanimously

Animal Control Officer Brandon Farmer:

Animal Control Officer Brandon Farmer let members of the court know they had 27 dogs of which 25 were adopted and 23 cats of which nineteen were adopted during the month of September. He thanked Friends of Powell County Pets for supplying vaccines and flea medicine for the animal shelter. Last month Brandon mentioned the partnership they have with one of the local shelters for supplying dry food for the animals, which is approximately \$12,000.00 in savings.

There was a case of parvo at the shelter, but they took precautions so that it did not spread.

Brandon said the KECOA Conference he attended was beneficial and he made connections with several people and looks forward to attending next year.

He would like to install a fence around the animal shelter. Having a fence will allow the animal to have yard time which is good for their behavioral health. It will also help in preventing them from escaping.

Brandon received a quote from Prince Auto Detailing in the amount of \$700.00. This quote is for stripping the Nitro, Silverado and the Dodge.

Brandon told members of the court he would like to take an enthusiasm course sometime soon.

CSEPP Director Kevin Babcock:

CSEPP Director Kevin Babcock let members of the court know there will be an end CSEPP IPT luncheon at Natural Bridge on November 13, 2025. They will be discussing what they have accomplished over the past thirty years. Rocky Atkins and the Lieutenant Governor plan on attending. Each county present will speak for five minutes. Kevin asks members of the court to RSVP if they plan on attending.

CSEPP is in the closing stages. All paperwork has been submitted for 2010 through 2020. We are waiting for approval to close out years 2021 through 2023 and 2024 through 2025 have not begun. All the equipment will be turned over on December 30th, 2025.

E911 Director Justin Rice said in moving forward with NCIC everyone will have to get re-fingerprinted again.

The person doing the fingerprinting does not invoice therefore we will have to use county credit card to pay for the service. Justin asks for court approval to fingerprint 10 employees at a cost of around \$22.00 per person.

A motion was made by Magistrate J.L. Bowen seconded by Magistrate Chad Patton with all members present voting in favor approving for 10 E911 employees to be fingerprinted at a cost of around \$22.00 per person. The county credit card will be used for the charges. Motion passed unanimously

A motion was made by Magistrate J.L. Bowen seconded by Magistrate Chad Patton with members present voting in favor approving the purchase of a new refrigerator for the EMS building. Motion passed unanimously

EMA Director John Knootz.

EMA Director John Knootz let members of the court know he had not checked the sirens last month, but Ricky does a silent test every day. John asks members if he could test them quarterly since they are all working and if not, can he test them one day throughout the week. If we do a day through the week, we may contact the schools about teachers teaching the children about what to do when they hear a warning siren. John said they would have to get it approved first. Judge Barnes said if they are working, he does not have a problem with the sirens being tested quarterly but, in the spring, months do the testing more often. CSEPP Director Kevin Babcock said the annual checks are done in March. Members of the court agreed to the quarterly siren testing and to check with the schools for one day a week.

John let members know all the paperwork has been submitted to Frankfort for reimbursement.

- ***Magistrate Dennis Combs***: Questions on Michael Kelso's ditch and pine trees on Mill Stone Road. Road Supervisor Patrick McCoy told Magistrate Combs that they just needed to get both scheduled.

Judge Barnes said we will need to get Larry Hall and Micheal Kelso to sign an agreement for services to be performed. Patrick said he had sample copy of this agreement. County Attorney Robert King asked him to forward a copy so that he could look over it.

Judge Executive Eddie Barnes – Appreciates all departments

Discussion of Jail Commissary:

Judge Barnes said in the past we had an agreement with the jail to give the county \$13,500.00 monthly from the commissary fund to help with jail payments. Jailer Teddy Lacy told us he could no longer give the county money out of the commissary fund because it was only for the benefit of the inmates. Judge Barnes said he had spoken with other jailers about inmate health insurance. We are currently paying Southern Health Partners. Judge Barnes said we could use the \$13,500.00 for the medical part and reallocate the money we are paying for insurance for something else.

Jailer Teddy Lacy was not present for the meeting so they could not discuss this with him.

Magistrate Brian McKinney said the jail could pay for the health expenses directly from the commissary account and cut out the middleman. Judge Barnes said we could cut it down to \$17,000.00 and let them pay for their portion of the health expenses.

Homestead Drive and Allie Lane Adopted into the County Road System:

Magistrate Brian McKinney told members of the court he had received a letter dated today from Gary Story. The letter read:

I Gary Story live on Alley Lane and I am here to request that Homestead Drive and Allie Lane be annexed as county roads as previously discussed within the fiscal court and I am here to represent the residents of Homestead Subdivision.
Respectfully Gary Story.

Judge Barnes said that Road Supervisor Patrick McCoy went and looked at the property and driveways.

Road Supervisor Patrick told members of the court that as far as the requirement per ordinance there are things that can and cannot be accepted as far as drainage and things of this nature to be considered for adoption. He said he found some exposed pavement, but it seemed to meet the requirements. These roads will need to be resurfaced but the City of Stanton is going to donate \$25,000.00 towards these projects. Judge Barnes asked members of the court if they move, they move forward with the bidding process for the blacktopping providing the roads are adopted. Patrick is estimating the cost to be around \$75,000.00.

Judge Barnes suggested doing Homestead Drive this year and Allie Lane next year.

County Attorney Robert King said per KRS the County Road Foreman should make the request and it requires that two of the Magistrates go and view the roads which Magistrate Brian McKinney and Magistrate Dennis Combs have already done. After the Magistrates are done viewing the roads they make a recommendation to the fiscal court for approval.

Magistrate Brian McKinney, Magistrate Dennis Combs and Road Foreman Patrick McCoy are recommending that Homestead Drive and Allie Lane be adopted in the county road system at this time.

A motion was made by Magistrate Brian McKinney seconded by Magistrate Dennis Combs with all members present voting in favor of adopting Homestead Drive and Allie Lane into the county road system.

Motion passed unanimously

Solid Waste Coordinator Tim Snowden:

Solid Waste Coordinator Tim Snowden let members of the court know they had started their CDL classes. Three of the six have gotten their permits. One employee has passed two of the tests and has one remaining. They will be going to the Clay City Dragstrip to do the driving portion of the class.

Opioid Abatement Liaison Andrea Knox let members of the court know they are finishing up with recovery applications. Jennifer Goley from Clark County and Jennifer Miles from Clark County ASAP attended their last meeting. Clark County is baby steps ahead of us. They have been working on their strategic recovery plans and how to spend their opioid abatement funds for next year.

LeAndra said they also have been working on theirs, it's just a process and they want to make sure they give the fiscal court good recommendations.

LeAndra gave an update on overdoes her in the county for the month of September.

We now have 10 total overdoes, forty suspected overdoes and five suspected fatal overdoes.

LeAndra and Rob had training on their Dashboard. This will help them track data, keep notes and track referrals on individuals that overdose. They discussed in the last meeting to ask the fiscal court to approve \$5,000.00 from the opioid abatement funds to purchase working supplies such as QRT t shirts, laptops, etc. They will have a QTR code for referrals that can be dropped off at businesses. They would like to have business cards made up.

They have bags with Narcan in them but are running low. This may be something the advisory council will bring to the fiscal court for recommendation.

A motion was made by Magistrate J.L. Bowen seconded by Magistrate Chad Patton with all members present voting in favor approving \$5,000.00 out of the Opioid Abatement funds for a working supply budget.
